

So much has changed in only eight years. Back in 2012, when we started collecting bread a few nights a week in our minivans, we could not have imagined the Food Link of 2020.

This year, we are embarking on a capital project to transform our new Arlington location into the Food Link Hub. The Hub will enable us to accommodate new food

donors, recipients, and volunteers, and to grow dramatically over the next five years. But the Hub will be more than a food-in/food-out operations center, it will be the heart of our community.

Volunteers have powered Food Link since the beginning. In the Hub, we will finally have an accessible, efficient, and comfortable space for volunteers to collect, sort, and distribute fresh, nutritious food. We will also have the space we have long desired to jump-start education initiatives about food waste, environmental sustainability, and nutrition.

We can only realize our vision for the Food Link Hub with your support. We have launched a \$3.25 million Capital Campaign to renovate the building. As 2020 begins, we are 40% of the way toward this goal. 




Our Next Step

Food Link aspires to have a food system without waste, in which everyone has enough. We rescue surplus fresh food that would otherwise be wasted and deliver it to community organizations serving people in need.

We have surpassed the limits of our current facilities and need to expand to meet the growing demand for our services.



An environmentally-sustainable and accessible building will enable our staff and 250+ volunteers to efficiently and effectively accomplish our mission. Expanded facilities with increased storage and refrigeration will enable us to grow dramatically in the next five years.







Our Story

Julie Kremer and DeAnne Dupont started Food Link in 2012, when they began rescuing unsold fresh food. Confronted with the reality of fresh, nutritious food going to waste, they recognized the synergy of delivering food to community organizations that feed those in need.

Over the past 8 years, Food Link has linked millions of pounds of food, which would have otherwise been wasted, with people in the community.

In 2019, we collected and distributed over

600,000 pounds of food,

which is the equivalent of

500,000 meals.


In its existence, Food Link has diverted a cumulative total of

Our Model

We collect nutritious food from grocery stores, wholesalers, and farms, and deliver it to community organizations serving people in need. But Food Link is so much more than just a food transportation system.

We take pride in nourishing the bodies of the hungry and the spirit of the community by bringing food to the places where people already live, learn, and play. We work to tailor the size, timing, and make-up of our deliveries to meet the needs of our partner organizations and those they serve, 7 days a week, 363 days a year.

This has cemented Food Link's strong reputation among community partners and donors as a nimble, flexible, and dependable organization. In being so, we deliver food with dignity, promote human connection, and build community.

Our Challenge

Routinely, we turn away food donors and community organizations because we don't have capacity, knowing that food is being wasted, people are hungry, and community members are missing out on rewarding opportunities.

In 2018, Food Link took a giant step toward addressing this challenge by purchasing its own building, which is located at 108 Summer Street in Arlington. This building, once renovated, will give us the ability to say 'yes' to those organizations seeking to partner with us, and enable us to increase our impact.

Our operations staff is ready to act on lists of shelters, senior centers, and youth programs who need food; grocery stores, farm shares, and trucking companies that have food to donate; and service organizations seeking volunteer opportunities in an accessible building.

Our Plan

We are creating the Food Link Hub, which will open in 2020 and will serve as the heart of our community.

We will strategically grow Food Link's operations, and by 2025, we anticipate Food Link will:

- divert 2 million pounds of food annually from the waste stream
- deliver enough food to our community for 1.6 million meals annually
- tailor deliveries to meet the dietary, cultural, and scheduling needs of our partners





The Food Link Hub will work for the community...

The Hub will dramatically increase Food Link's capacity to rescue and redistribute food, streamline our operations, and meet the needs of recipients by providing:



A **loading dock** that accommodates large vehicles with pallets of surplus food



Expanded cold storage allowing for just-in-time food deliveries that meet recipient needs



Indoor food sorting space for volunteers, away from inclement weather



An accessible building to welcome a wider range of volunteer groups and visitors



A community space for education sessions on food waste, environmental sustainability, and nutrition



...and the environment.

The Hub is designed to be a High-Performance Building and minimize Food Link's impact on the environment. This is achieved by integrating:



Solar panels that are projected to offset the energy use of the refrigeration



Air Source VRF Heat Pump for climate control



High R-value **insulation and windows** to reduce energy consumption and operating costs



Repurposed and discontinued building materials and supplies





Our Future

The need to nourish our community continues to grow. Cuts to food-relief services across the nation make news regularly. Despite food abundance, people still go hungry. Research shows that 1 out of 9 Americans struggles with hunger and 40% of food is wasted; left in the fields, on the supermarket shelves, or on our plates. Meanwhile, food waste strains our planet.
